## Things you may want to know this week

We pray for a peaceful turnover of leadership in our country with the Presidential Inauguration coming up this Wednesday, January 20<sup>th</sup>. We can only do our best to be generous in these times. The 2021 AAA will be delayed than the usual start and will formally begin on Monday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Ordinary Time does not refer to some parts of the church year that are unimportant. It refers to the period of Church liturgical year that fall outside of the major seasons like Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" because the weeks are numbered. The Latin word "*ordinalis*," which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word "*ordo*." From which we get the English word "order." Thus, Ordinary Time is in fact the ordered life of the Church.
